J. R. Littleproud's outline of Psalm 23:

The secret of a happy life—every need supplied. "The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want."

The secret of a happy death—every fear removed.

The secret of a happy eternity—every desire fulfilled. "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever."
